Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

It is with great joy that we welcome you to the 2022 Diocesan Assembly. A little more than a year ago we gathered as a Diocesan family after an open consultation with over 1500 people from across the Archdiocese. Our Assembly last year was firstly a time of listening to one another and to the Holy Spirit. At the end of that Assembly, we made three promises, and we have upheld each of them:

- To form a new Diocesan Pastoral Council. Immediately following the 2021 Assembly, the Interim
 Diocesan Pastoral Council (DPC) was formed. Throughout 2022 the members of the DPC have
 worked to discern strategic priorities based on the recommendations of the 2021 Assembly,
 developing a mission and vision for the Archdiocese, and setting the groundwork for the formal DPC,
 which will commence in 2023.
- 2. To review and discern the recommendations from the 2021 Diocesan Assembly. As soon as the 2021 Assembly concluded, many Communities, Parishes, Schools and Diocesan services began to discern the recommendations in light of their own contexts. The recommendations, along with the various other Diocesan consultations that have taken place, informed our Diocesan Report to the 2023 Global Synod. In June we invited Parishes, Schools, Communities and Agencies to share their discernment of the recommendations, which involved almost 1800 people so far.
- 3. **To hold a Diocesan Assembly in 2022.** We knew then that becoming a church *together on the way* would take time and practice. We need to develop our muscles for synodality. To do this we must continue to gather, to listen, discern, and move in mission. So here we are!

The 2022 Diocesan Assembly is an opportunity for a wayside stop. To take stock of where we have been, to discern our current realities in the light of the Gospel, and to plan for action as we get back on the road.

The next 24 hours or so will have a particular focus on mission. Yes, we will pray and listen, for we must do so in order to prepare ourselves to discern the ways in which we as the community of the People of God might participate, and draw others in participation, in the mission of God.

So as we enter this Diocesan Assembly, let us be open to the Holy Spirit, that we may be respond to the promptings and movement of the Spirit; that we would have the courage to step out in faith; and that we might truly be a Church *Together on the Way*.





2021 Diocesan Assembly Recommendations


Feedback Results

At the 2021 Diocesan Assembly, participants developed 255 recommendations for the Archdiocese as well as local contexts. Some recommendations also addressed the universal Church. In June 2022, parishes, schools, communities and diocesan agencies were invited to reflect on the recommendations and discern the top three recommendations that could be applied to their own context, as well as the top three priorities for the Archdiocese.

LOCAL: Top 5 Recommendations



- **1.5** Communication connecting post school; local areas of need; practical actions that can be taken (volunteering); Using modern media effectively and creatively (young people are great at this!); Putting poverty at the centre.
- **4.2** Stop looking to old models of ministry and service Pope Francis has encouraged us with his openness to women and young people.
- **2.6** That all communities recognise the importnace of ongoing, lifelong faith formation through: good experience of prayer and liturgy; opportunities to encounter Christ through such things as "Alpha" and "MenAlive"; Sacramental programs that fully engage all family members and the faith community; communication about suitable online resources.
- **5.8** Young people engaged in and consulted on the structure of the mass (sic) and communities. Create experiences/events that engage young people and young parents.
- **6.8** Make our churches places of celebration that are attractive to others be involved, be active, be proud, be hospitable build connection and belonging.



ARCHDIOCESE: Top 6 Recommendations



- **4.2** Stop looking to old models of ministry and service Pope Francis has encouraged us with his openness to women and young people.
- **4.1** Enable opportunities for women to undertake roles of leadership in the Archdiocese.
- **4.11** Continued discernment, development and implementation of new models of leadership for clergy & laity to minister in the multicultural reality of the Church today, across the Archdiocese. New models of leadership should incorporate inclusivity, gender and celibacy.
- **5.3** We ask for clear inclusion and representation of communities (make explicitly welcome groups through words and actions). Inclusive of language, culture, gender and identity (e.g. an acknowledgement of country before Mass).
- **3.2** Use inclusive language in liturgy.

Workshop Themes

Inclusion and Healing

We must recognise Aboriginal and Torres Straight Islander peoples by strengthening and expanding good practices and pastoral supports. Develop inclusive reconciliation processes that begin with acknowledgement of the harm and lack of inclusion on behalf of the church and work toward healing. We must commit to being a church of inclusivity, hospitality and welcome to all. We must also continue listening and being in dialogue with others, especially those who have been marginalised by the church and society.

Leadership and Leadership Formation

With Jesus as our model, there must be continued discernment, development and implementation of new models of leadership for clergy and laity, particularly women and young people, to minister and govern collaboratively and synodally in the church today. Greater resources are needed to support the recruitment, training, ongoing formation and wellbeing of ordained and lay leaders - professional and volunteer. Stronger collaboration between leaders of parishes, schools, agencies and the diocese.

Faith Formation and Spiritual Development

Providing a diveristy of accessible, high quality faith formation and spiritual development for all ages and stages of life is a priority. While the faith education and formation of children is desired, there is a particular need for adult formation. Multimodal resources and professional support must be provided for individuals, families, schools, parishes, and communities. There must be greater collaboration across parishes and schools in the development, sharing and implementation of formation and sacramental programs. Ongoing formation and training of leaders, staff and clergy is vital.

Parish Life and Liturgy

Parishes are central to the expression of the Christian life. To enhance parish life, we must develop strategies, resources and formation for parishes and communities to be places of hospitality, welcome, inclusion and belonging and to become outward focussed and engaged in mission. Greater collaboration and communication between schools and parishes. The most visible aspect of parish life is in its liturgical life. Diverse liturgical and eucharistic celebrations are needed that reflect the realities of the people in the communities, including music, language, homilies, ministries and leadership.

A Church that Responds to the Cry of the Earth and the Cry of the Poor

Inspired by our rich tradition in Catholic Social Teaching, and including Pope Francis' writings, each of us has a responsibility to care for Creation and one another. Our homes, schools, parishes and diocesan agencies must commit to action, education, and transformation in the areas of ecological justice, protection of the most vulnerable, peace and reconciliation with First Nations people, and elimination of all injustice. We cannot do this alone, we must collaborate with other communities of faith and in the civic arena.

Outreach and Accompaniment of Children, Families and Young People

Accompaniment of children, families and young people means building personal relationships with individuals and developing an understanding of their needs and life situations. We must respond to the needs of children, families and young people by providing new, relevant and accessible ways for them to be in community, to be formed in their faith, and participate in the life, faith and mission of the church.

Workshop Round 3 SMALL GROUP DISCUSSION

Gather in groups of 3 or 4 and share from your personal reflection.

- Allow each person to share their reflections with the group. Do not interrupt the person or ask questions (this will happen a little later)
- After a person has shared their idea. Allow a few moments of silent reflection.
- Go to the next person and use the same process until everyone has had a chance to share.
- When everyone has finished sharing, the group should respond to one another with comments that:
 - Affirm the ideas shared by each person
 - Add value (refrain from criticism or shutting someone down)
- Finally, each person may comment on any new ideas or inspiration they have received from others in the group sharing.

Step Five: Commitment

The final step of this process today is to share your intention to action with the rest of the Diocesan Assembly.

These cards will be collected into a book of intentions that will be distributed to all parishes, communities, schools, and agencies in the Archdiocese. The purpose is to use the intentions for ongoing support of one another, prayer for one another, and inspiration from one another.

The action I intend to bring to life in my community:

The Diocesan Pastoral Council

The Archdiocese of Adelaide has re-established the Diocesan Pastoral Council in an interim capacity. The DPC will work to further the discernment and implementation of recommendations from the Diocesan Assembly and the decrees of the Plenary Council. An interim DPC has been established for 2021-22 to develop these areas and the norms for the substantial DPC, which will be formalised after the 2022 Diocesan Assembly.

The Diocesan Pastoral Council established in 2022 is:

- 1. an expression of commitment to the journey of synodality in the Archdiocese of Adelaide;
- 2. a major diocesan body which exercises leadership under the authority of the Archbishop by investigating, considering and proposing practical priorities and strategies about the spiritual and pastoral life and activity in the Archdiocese;
- 3. a community of dialogue, reflection and discernment which seeks and listens to the voices of all in the local Church and the people of this part of the world;
- 4. a consultative body in partnership with other diocesan bodies to support the Archbishop, diocesan leadership and other bodies in their local church leadership roles.

It carries out the key functions:

- 1. To work with the Archbishop and Archdiocesan leaders to strategically plan the implementation of the outcomes arising from the 5th Australian Plenary Council and Diocesan assemblies.
- 2. To discern and develop, through wide consultation, the vision and mission of the Archdiocese.
- 3. To endeavour to identify the challenges and needs of the Archdiocese in its life and mission to this part of the world.
- 4. To raise matters which the Council considers to be of spiritual and pastoral concern, and after discernment, to make appropriate recommendations to the Archbishop.
- 5. To receive information or briefings on matters deemed to be of significant spiritual and pastoral importance to the people of the diocese.
- 6. To review proposals that seek to make changes to the existing structure of parishes within the diocese and provide advice to the Archbishop on their suitability.
- 7. To develop and implement strategies and mechanisms for consultation and communication with key councils, commissions, advisory bodies, relevant agencies, (e.g. Council of Priests, Diocesan Finance Council, Parish Pastoral Councils, etc.) as well as schools, parishes and other forms of Catholic communities throughout the Archdiocese.
- 8. To convene Diocesan assemblies and provide opportunities for consultation across the Archdiocese.
- 9. To ensure the progression, review and reporting of its decisions as well as the provision for communication with and feedback from key councils, advisory bodies and relevant agencies through an executive function of the Council which operates with the assistance of the Pastoral Services Team.
- 10. To conduct a review of its purpose and functions every 2 years.

DPC Expressions of Interest

We are seeking a diverse, skilled membership who can demonstrate leadership and commitment to the Gospel.

Expressions of interest for membership of the Diocesan Pastoral Council need to include a brief written description of why you feel called to to be a member of the council and what experience, gifts and skills they can offer. Two referees, one of which is their parish priest must also be included.
